Introduction

n 2020, about 10 million Nigerian children of school age were out of school according to the United Nations Organisation. So many factors have been responsible for this disturbing figure which keeps soaring. Having millions of children out of school has been among factors fueling social vices and insecurity in many parts of the country.

Nigeria being a signatory to the United Nation Education, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) on children's education has not achieved free and quality primary and secondary education in many communities across its 36 states and the Federal Capital Territory. Furthermore, the Beijing Conference of 1995 made recommendations for the education of children especially the girl child who should have equal opportunities as her male counterparts, among other issues of equality of rights and rights to health which is not being adhered to in its entirety.

In response, ActionAid Nigeria launched the Partnership against Poverty now known as the Local Rights Programme in Ondo State, in 2005 with Kids and Teens Resource Center which later transited into its current partnership with Justice Development and Peace Commission (JDPC). It was focused on rights-based programming through capacity building of community members on rights conscientisation, participatory advocacy and issue-based campaigns. The programme also employed service modeling through infrastructural provisions addressing issues of inequality and rights denial.

Communities of intervention were selected based on poverty indices, Government presence and their exclusion. The Local Rights Programme constructed and renovated several schools to increase school enrollment, retention, and completion of child education. Furniture and toilet facilities were provided to aid conducive learning environment for quality education.

The programme which has women as its primary focus as they are worst hit and seen as the face of poverty in different communities, gave them a voice through its flagship peer education programme, helping them step down and activate learnings to resolve household and community issues. The women advocated to duty bearers for women inclusion in decision making and provision of gender responsive public services in communities by Government. Some of these advocacies had seen to the provision of health centres in Wasinmi Odunwo and solar powered boreholes in Molato community. Pregnant women need not travel several kilometers on motorcycles in the night to deliver their babies because the health centre is now closer and affordable.

Some communities also benefited in terms of youth engagement in electoral processes and their participation in community development. They were empowered with trainings, counseling and income generating skill set, all in an effort to curb youth restiveness. The Local Right Programme also empowered several communities across the three senatorial zones of the state to advocate on water issues which has helped members of the community to avoid water borne diseases and helped children in getting early to school as they are not burdened with waking up early to source for potable water from far distance.

Water is essential to life and ActionAid Nigeria is proud to be associated with these success stories in these communities and will be delighted to hear of more programme gains as a result of sustainability mechanisms activated at the state and community levels.



Programme Overview

ActionAid (AA) started work in Nigeria in 2000 and programme in the areas of Education, Food and Agriculture, Just and Democratic Governance, Human Security in Conflict and Emergencies, Health, and Women's Rights: working with I Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs) and Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) at the community, state and national levels through participatory approaches. It is focused on strengthening the movement against poverty through alliance and coalition building activities targeted at building capacity of CSOs and Governments in enhancing civil participation and addressing policy issues.

In 2002, ActionAid Nigeria (AAN) decided to move beyond the single theme intervention dependent on donor funding and introduced the child sponsorship mechanism which is an AAN fundraising mechanism to support its development work in its thematic areas. Under this mechanism, a sponsor from Italy or other Alliance Partner Country is linked to a child in the community and a bond is built between both which leads to improvements in the child's community and for his/her family's benefit. This long –term integrated development programme is called the Local Rights Programme (LRP) which is currently being implemented in 18 states, with Ondo, Bauchi, and Akwa-Ibom scheduled to phase out after benefiting from the programme for almost two decades.

LRP was established to achieve ActionAid's vision and mission of working with poor and excluded people. It was known as Partnership Against Poverty (PAP) until 2012 when the new structure of ActionAid Nigeria was established. The programme is now known as Partnerships and Local Rights Programme.

The main objective of LRP was to improve the socio-economic status of poor women, men and children in LRP states by mobilizing communities and building their capacities to implement people centered development programmes using the Human Rights Based Approach to programming. This is done through a three-pronged approach; Empowering grassroots community through rights consciousness and supporting locally initiated projects, capacity building of local institutions and supporting policy and advocacy initiatives that ensure that the voices of people living in poverty are listened to and their rights respected.

Since inception, the programme has reached over 10,080 women and 17,280 children through different activities. The intervention has also reached over 105 persons with disabilities.

Over the years, through capacity building by ActionAid and JDPC advocacy and engagement of duty bearers by the communities, the top 10 key achievements include but are not limited to:





Establishment and Construction of a Primary School with 4 classrooms in Molato Community, construction of 4 classroom school in Wasinmi Odunwo, construction of 4 classroom school in Ilado community, renovation of Olorunsogo primary school, Renovation of St Anthony primary school. There is increased enrolment, retention and completion as a result of the school. The population in the school is over 400. The renovation of the school makes the school conducive for learning and also increase the retention of pupils.



Establishment of Women Community Based Organization (CBO) with provision of canopy for rentals in Alayere community, oil processing mill in Oloruntedo and garri processing mill in Lota Community which has boosted their income and reduced the stress women undergo in processing their cassava and palm fruits. Part of the proceeds from the palm oil processing mill was used in the roofing of the Oloruntedo community townhall.



Improved Human capacity development as the people can on their own organize, plan and mobilize for engagement with duty bearers on issues that affect the community especially women.



5 Establishment and construction of Health Centre in Ago Daada community leading to reduction in outbreaks and water borne diseases.



A key learning is that poverty eradication intervention requires participatory development effort involving communities, CSOs, Government both at local and state levels. ActionAid hopes that communities and Government will continue to leverage on the capacity strengthening interventions provided throughout the lifecycle of the programme to sustain the programme gains and create the change they want to see in their lives and communities in Ondo state.

ELECTION OF FIRST EVER YOUTH GOVERNMENT IN THE COMMUNITY LEADING TO PEACE AMONG COMMUNITY YOUTHS

olorunduro community connects 15 villages in Ondo North Local Government Area. Most of these communities are difficult to reach and with little or no government presence.

Babatunde Olasoji, the traditional ruler of Bolorunduro who oversees other 15 villages said the community had existed for about 200 years after its people migrated from Akure, present day Ondo State capital.

Despite the long existence of the community and closeness to the state capital, development has been very slow with limited Government presence.

"Before ActionAid came to our rescue, our children were attending secondary schools in Aiyede-Ogbese, a distance of over 70 kilometres. In Bolorunduro, we have 15 villages, children from those villages were having problems because there were no secondary schools but after ActionAid established a secondary school here for us, life has become easier" "The children are closer to the school and parents need not fear again that their children are facing dangers on the way to school," he said.

The traditional ruler recalled incidences of motorbike accidents and injuries as a result of long travel time to school: "Before they established the school for us, there were cases of children traveling the long distances on motorcycles, and we have had cases where some of them got knocked down by vehicles.

The traditional ruler, a former weapon instructor at the Nigerian Defense Academy, Kaduna, said ActionAid did not force any project on the community but conducted an opinion poll to know what need was paramount. In addition, the traditional ruler mentioned the intervention ActionAid had in empowering his community through training which has put an end to youth restiveness in the area.

"As a community, we were able to know our rights through the various sessions they have held with us. For the first time, we had elected youth executives. It was through them we organised the first ever youth government in the community. Before now we used to have clashes among the youths but now it is very peaceful. We cannot but thank ActionAid for bringing this development," he said.

AN END TO OPEN DEFECATION

efore the intervention of ActionAid in St. Anthony C.R.M. Primary School in Alayere pupils of the school knew nothing but open defecation when nature calls. "ActionAid has put an end to open defecation in this primary school and the children do not face the dangers associated with open defecation any longer," said Afolabi Fatima Olufunmilayo, the school head teacher.

She further stated "Thankfully, ActionAid came in good time and helped to also rebuild a block of classrooms that had collapsed. This initially made some parents withdrew their children but now the children have returned, and life returned to the school," she said.

Presently, the school has 74 boys and 54 girls totaling 128 pupils because of modern infrastructure that can support learning.

Aside the toilet facilities ActionAid provided, the head teacher noted that learning materials were also provided: "ActionAid usually comes to visit the school, pay the exam fees for some poor pupils, providing their needed learning materials. The school serves the community but some of the children especially those who have lost one or both parents must be assisted to get primary education. Thankfully, ActionAid has been on ground to support this category of pupils".



THRIVING WOMEN

lamide Akinola, Secretary, Women Peer Association in Olorunsogo community recounts how women in her community prioritised farming to household functions such as caring for the children, keeping the environment clean and hygiene: "Ever before they came here, we women would wake up and resume on the farms without even preparing the children for school, but they taught us that our labour to make ends meet would be in vain if we don't care for the future of our children. Then we had to adjust," she said.

Family Planning

There was little knowledge of family planning in the entire community before ActionAid launched the LRP. Women in this community do not plan for childbirth, they do not space their children, and there was little knowledge of family planning Olamide Akinola said.

"They educated us on family planning, and we saw the need to plan our families as against the former nonchalant attitude. We were counseled not to produce children beyond our capacity and that was how many of us started with family planning and today we are better off" she said.

The community produces cash crops, but the soil is not the best for cassava and other staple food crops. but now with this knowledge, they can plan their families and available food can sustain them.





























A NEW BEGINING

"I started my cocoa nursery business through ActionAid" - Jolaade Bobade.

Alayere community in Akure North Local Government Area of Ondo State is an agrarian community, majorly growing cash crops like Palm trees and Cocoa.

Jolaade Bobade is a cocoa farmer in the community, he tells of how his life has turned around for good since his engagement with ActionAid and JDPC.

Bobade had no job, it was a tough life for him, he thought and wished for support to begin cocoa business, he had no support from friends, families, or the government. He lived each day with hope. His dream came through the LRP, Bobade still tickles with excitement: "It was through ActionAid that I got the little financial assistance I needed to start my cocoa nursery business," he said.

Narrating further, he said, "I went to Benin to buy the seedlings and bags for the nursery. Today I have a total of 5,500 seedlings in the nursery and by June people would start buying at the rate of N100 per unit for the planting season. I thank ActionAid because if they didn't have project in this village, I wouldn't have gotten the opportunity," he said with a wide smile.

ActionAid supports women farmers, children, youths.

Folashade Ogunsusi is a community leader and a farmer in Alayere community; she said the engagement with ActionAid and JDPC had restored some form of economic activities in the community.

"I thank ActionAid for remembering Alayere. There are about 30 communities around, but we are among those they decided to visit. They taught us modern ways of farming, how to plant cocoa, plantain, tomatoes and supplied us six months cassava seedlings. ActionAid said if there is no farmer there is no food.

THE BLISS OF EASE

n Molato community children walk about 6 kilometres to Ala, another community to attend primary school, before they commence the journey to school, they wake up as early as 3 a.m. to fetch water. The two major issues in this community were water and absence of primary school. The school in the community was in an unsafe condition, it was dilapidated, and pupils feared it could fall apart anytime.

According to the Head Teacher, Anyor Gabriel, who got to the village 35 years ago, the school building is ActionAid's first project in the village: It is a block of five classrooms and the headmasters' office. "Not that the school was not in existence before ActionAid intervened in the community, but the school building was old and dilapidated. Our children were learning under a big mango tree and there was nothing to show that we had a school until ActionAid came to build the block of classrooms for us," he explained.

Narrating further, Gabriel said: "Before the primary school was fixed, our children used to travel for 6 kilometers to Ala, another town, to school every school day.

"Aside the health hazards of stress and body weakness, there were other dangers the children encountered. Some boys used to hide in the bush to attack them. So many girls were raped in the process, and it was a worrisome experience for us all. But since the primary school is now functional, we are now at rest that the little ones are safe with us in the community. The bigger ones walk in groups and can defend themselves; things are now easier though we still need a secondary school," he said.

Speaking on other amenities "They also provided a water well, though they met with serious obstacles due to the nature of our terrain here being a rocky area, they didn't get water in time, they blasted three different rocks underground while digging the well. The well though deep, the water is still not rushing. We still need to blast another rock. At least we have some clean water to drink now," he said.
